EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Ahafo Ano South West District Assembly is one of 43 districts of the Ashanti Region. It was established by legislative instrument (*L.I*) 2334 of 14th November, 2017 and was carved out of the then Ahafo Ano District Assembly, with Mankranso as its Capital. The District is guided by the implementation of its District Medium Term Development Plan (DMTDP 2018-2021) which is in line with the Agenda for Jobs creation, prosperity and equal opportunity policy framework. The focus of the DMTDP is to improve the socio- economic and the environmental conditions of people in the District. It is important to evaluate the progress of the DMTDP on a quarterly and annual basis by measuring the indicators and assessing the milestones reached.

The 2020 Action plan had a total of 96 Programs and projects and as at the 31st of December which is the end of the 4th quarter and the annual action year, the district had been able to implement about 7 (7.3%), about 83 (86.5%) of the activities are ongoing, whiles 6 (6.3%) are yet to be implemented. The total funds received for DACF for the year was **4,178,573.10** representing (97.32%) of the budgeted figure of 4,293,578.7. A total of 340,779.98 (85.79%) of Internally Generated Funds have so far been realized out of the budgeted amount of 397,243.50 cedis.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Purpose of Monitoring and Evaluation for Stated Period, 2020

The rationale for developing Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) for the implementation of 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan is summarized as follows:

- To assess whether 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan (DMTDP, 2018-2021) developmental targets were being met.
- To document progress made and lessons learnt from the implementation of programmes, projects and activities.
- To improve service delivery and influence allocation of resources in the District.
- To demonstrate M&E results to stakeholders as part of accountability and transparency.
- To provide information for effective coordination of District's development at the regional and national levels, African Union Agenda, 2063 and the Sustainable Development Goals, 2016-2030.
- To identify achievements, constraints and failures so that improvements can be made to the Composite Annual Action Plan (CAAP) and project designs to achieve better impact.

1.2 Summary of Achievements of the Implementation of the DMTDP

The 2020 Annual Progress Report is the appraisal of all programmes, projects and activities implemented during the quarters (from 1st January to 31st December) embedded in the 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan of the Ahafo Ano South-West District Assembly. The focus is to find out if the targets set by the District were achieved during the period under review. The Annual Progress Report will enable the District to measure the actual performance against the set targets. The report presents the result of the assessment of the indicators and targets adopted for monitoring and evaluating the achievements and impacts of key policy and Programme interventions executed in the 2020.

• Proportion of Composite Annual Action Plan (CAAP) Implemented by the End of 2020

Out of 96 programmes, projects and activities proposed for implementation in the year 2020. Out of the 96, Six (6) accounting for 6.3 percent was not initiated 83 representing 86.5 percent were initiated out of which 7 forming 7.3 percent were fully completed with an overall performance of 93.75 percent. The performance of the district especially in the area of a higher percentage ongoing could be attributed to the covid 19 pandemic which halted most activities

during the second and third quarters of year 2020. Table 1.1 shows the level of implementation of the 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan. It is worth mentioning that, the District has successfully implemented the first 36 months (January, 2018 to December, 2020) of the four years of the plan that is, from 2018 to 2021 using the CAAP aggregated from the Eleven (11) Decentralized Departments of the Assembly. In the first 36 months of the four years, the District has initiated 182 programmes, projects and activities, out of which 179 representing 98.4 percent have been implemented.

• Overall Proportion of the DMTDP Implemented within the Four Year Period (2018-2021)

Out of the 182 programmes, projects and activities proposed to be implemented within the plan period of 2018 to 2021, averagely 90 representing 51.4 percent were implemented. From the performance review of the DMTDP 2018-2021, the District has so far recorded 98.4 percent achievement. As a result of this, the District has seen a tremendous improvement in education, health, water, sanitation, energy, transportation, LED and job creation which has enhanced the quality life of the people. Again, all the cross-cutting issues targeting HIV/AIDS, gender, environment, climate change, population and social protection programmes have been fully integrated in the implementation of the programmes, projects and activities in the DMTDP (2018-2021). It is worth mentioning that not all the programmes, projects and activities implemented were from the plan. Table 1.1 shows the performance achievement of the implementation of the DMTDP 2018-2021.

Table 1.2 also shows the District's performance in terms of its achievement under the development dimensions of the National Medium Term Development framework (Agenda for Jobs Policy Framework). In 2020, Out of total executed projects/programmes of 90, 33 activities were initiated on social development whiles 13 were of the activities earmarked for the year were focused on economic development. Moreover, the district fully achieved all its planned activities under the economic and environment, infrastructure and human settlement dimensions in 2020.

1.3 Challenges Encountered in the Implementation of the DMTDP

The specific constraints, problems or difficulties encountered by the District Planning Coordinating Unit (DPCU) during the implementation, monitoring and evaluation of the 2020 Composite Annual Action Plans under the DMTDP 2018-2021 are outlined below.

The outbreak of COVID 19 Pandemic globally had a sterling effect on the activities of
the District due to the implementation of the restriction policy. The partial lockdown in
Greater Accra and the Greater Kumasi areas affected turnout to work. Additionally,
most departments could not embark on their earmarked activities due to these
restrictions.

- The major challenge facing the implementation of the plan is inadequate funding from all sources (GOG, DACF, DDF, IGF and Other Donor Support). This is because some of the DACF releases (2020 fourth quarter) to the District is still in arrears. Similarly, the DPAT grants for 2018 and 2019 are still in arrears.
- Inadequate logistical support and other resources for monitoring and evaluation activities in the District and at the sub-structures levels.
- Lack of assigned permanent vehicle for monitoring and evaluation of programmes, projects and activities in the District.
- Inadequate training programmes organized by NDPC on the preparation and reporting of DMTDPs, CAAP and Annual Progress Reports respectively.
- Lack of sustainable funds to conduct DPCU activities, Social Accountability Programmes, Evaluation and Participatory Monitoring and Evaluation.

1.4 Processes Involved in monitoring and evaluating of 2020 CAAP

During the year under review, the District Planning Coordinating Unit (DPCU) was committed to ensuring that implementation of projects and activities of the Assembly were according to plan and budget. Monthly and quarterly monitorings were carried out frequently.

The District Planning Co-ordinating Unit (DPCU) also facilitated the preparation of the 2021 Annual Progress Report with the involvement of all the 11 decentralized departments of the Ahafo Ano South-West District Assembly. Monitoring and Evaluation data were compiled from both primary and secondary sources. The secondary data were compiled from the various quarterly Reports of Departments and Agencies as well as from the District Assembly and its Area Councils.

The primary data were also obtained from the quarterly site meetings, Public Hearings, Town Hall Meetings, Social Accountability Forums and the quarterly meetings with the various stakeholders involved in the plan implementation and monitoring. The data were collated, analysed and evaluated by the DPCU. The final report will be disseminated to the public by the District Development Communication Committee at the Town Hall meeting of the Assembly. The report was finally submitted to the National Development Planning Commission (NDPC) through the Regional Co-ordinating Council.

2.0 MONITORING AND EVALUATION ACTIVITIES REPORT, 2020

The Ahafo-Ano South West District Assembly is mandated by the National Development

Planning Commission (NDPC) to prepare a 4-year Medium Term Development Plan (MTDP)

to cover 2018-2021 which would form the basis for wealth creation in the District and reduce

the incidence of poverty. The MTDP which is aligned within the framework of the National

Development Plan focuses on Agenda for jobs under these four out of the five pillars;

1. Economic Development

2. Social Development

3. Environmental, Infrastructure and Human Settlement

4. Governance, Corruption and Public Accountability

In this chapter, the status of programmes and projects under these pillars for the year 2020 are

presented. Out of the ninety-six (96) projects and programmes, six (6) of them were not initiated

at all by the end of the year. However, seven (7) were fully completed whiles about eighty three

(83) were at various stages and ongoing

2.2 Update on Funding Sources

A total of GH¢ **4,178,573.10** was the amount received by the Ahafo Ano South-West District Assembly by the end of the year. The range of the revenue sources include Internally Generated Fund (IGF), District Assemblies Common Fund (DACF), Member of Parliament Common Fund (MPCF), Disability Common Fund (PWDCF), MSHAP, Ghana School Feeding Programme (GSFP), SRWSP, District Development Facility (DDF) and Livelihood Empowerment Against Poverty (LEAP). A summary of the trend of revenue performance of the District is presented in Table 2.2

In order to generate enough IGF, adequate measures have been put in place to educate the public on the need to pay rates. In addition, several actions were taken by the Assembly to improve upon the revenue collection and management during the third quarter. These included compilation of revenue database register for major towns in the District, establishment of a Revenue Task Force, successful implementation of the 2020 Revenue Improvement Action Plan and the implementation of the Tax Revenue Economic Empowerment Program (TREE).

2.3 Update on Disbursement

In order to ensure effective implementation every plan and budget, revenue and expenditure report played a key role for successful implementation. This section of the progress report brings on board the revenue and expenditure for the year under review. This will demonstrate the total revenue generated within the year and how funds were released to finance the expenditure of the 2020 Composite Budget and the 2020 CAAP

From Table 2.3, in 2020, an amount $GH\phi3,136,838.52$ out of the total estimated expenditure of $GH\phi$ 22,241,785.50 was spent. However, out of the total actual receipts of $GH\phi4,178,573.10$ the District spent within the budget leaving a balance surplus of $GH\phi182,567.62$.

2.6 Evaluations Conducted, Their Findings and Recommendations

Evaluation plays a vital role in the life of every project implementation as the feedback always determines the success or failure of the project. Therefore, the evaluation of the achievements of the 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan was conducted using Ex-Ante Evaluation of the implementation of the programmes, projects and activities based on the M&E Calendar and Budget. This was performed by the DPCU with support from the collaborating Agencies and Stakeholders.

The conduct of the evaluations involved scrutinizing the status-quo reports and the analyzed data from both primary and secondary sources and comparing them with the appraisal reports during and after the implementation of the year's activities. Field surveys including data collection, analysis, observations, presentation and reporting were used to conduct the evaluation of the selected physical projects implemented in the year. In addition, the DPCU and Stakeholders Forum were used to valid and confirm the data before and after completion to ascertain if the intervention achieved its original objectives and assess the overall changes caused by the implementation of the physical project. From Table 2.6, Five (5) Ex-ante Evaluations were conducted in the District.

The findings of the evaluation revealed that all the selected physical projects implemented in the 2020, impacted positively on the quality life of the people in the District as exhibited in Table 2.6. However, funding for the implementation of most projects are lacking with respect to Central Government Transfers (GOG, DACF and DDF). It is therefore recommended that funds should be released timely and adequately toward the implementation of the rest of the quarters of 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan. In addition, adequate funds should be made readily available to conduct evaluations so as to improve decision making and provide insights for effective Programme, project and activity design and implementation in the District.

2.7 Participatory Monitoring and Evaluation Undertaken and Their Results

The key stakeholders who participated in the PM&E through the stakeholders' analysis included Traditional Authorities, Assembly Members, Unit Committee Members, Opinion Leaders, Contractors, Heads of Decentralised Departments and other Agencies, Political Parties (NPP and NDC), Civil Society Organisations, Religious Bodies, Financial Institutions, Artisans, Communities and Media. 3.0 CONCLUSION AND THE WAY FORWARD

This section summarizes the 2020 Annual Progress Report by exhibiting the key issues addressed and those yet to be addressed as well as the recommendations for successful implementation of subsequent quarters of the 2020 Composite Annual Action Plans (CAAP). The details are outlined in the sub-section 3.1 and 3.2.

3.1 Summary of Key Issues in 2020 and Those Yet to be Addressed

In the course of implementation of the 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan, the following key issues were identified and addressed successfully in 2020, which need to be sustained for the subsequent quarters.

- Funds for Monitoring and Evaluation activities were provided for the District Monitoring Team to conduct the exercise with ease. This provided funds for Quarterly M&E Reporting and the payment of Day Trip Allowances.
- Logistics in form of fuel, stationery and other Monitoring and Evaluation materials were provided timely for the conduct of the M&E exercise in the District. This provided solution to the logistical challenge raised by the District Monitoring Team.
- Funds were released for the 11 Decentralized Departments of the Assembly to carry-out their mandated programmes, projects and activities in the 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan. This addressed the challenge of lack of funds for Departments to carry-out their activities in the 2020 CAAP.

However, the implementation of the 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan was challenged with the following key issues, which are yet to be addressed, possibly in 2020.

- Inadequate and untimely release of DACF has negatively affected the implementation of programmes, projects and activities in the District. This issue is yet to be resolved by the District Assemblies Common Fund Administrator.
- Lack of assigned permanent vehicle for Monitoring and Evaluation of programmes, projects and activities in the District. This pending issue is yet to be rectified by management of the District Assembly.

3.2 Recommendations

In conclusion, the way forward to address the challenges faced in the Monitoring and Evaluation activities, in addition to those yet to be addressed, include the following.

 Provision of permanent vehicle for Monitoring and Evaluation exercise in the District will help to improve the routine inspection and supervision of programmes, projects and activities.

- Based on the challenges identified in the implementation of DACF programmes, the Assembly recommends timely and adequately release of DACF to finance the plan and budget implementation in the District.
- Based on the infrastructural challenges identified in the District, the Assembly recommends timely release of DPAT for 2017 and 2018 to finance the implementation of infrastructural gaps identified.
- Regular reshaping of road network in the District will improve Monitoring and Evaluation exercise.
- Organisation of Monitoring and Evaluation training programmes by the National Development Planning Commission (NDPC) to equip District Monitoring Teams with the required knowledge and experience.
- Setting-up DPCU Fund to promote the functionality of DPCU as enshrined in the Local Governance Act 936, 2016 and the National Development Planning (System) Regulations, LI 2232, 2016.

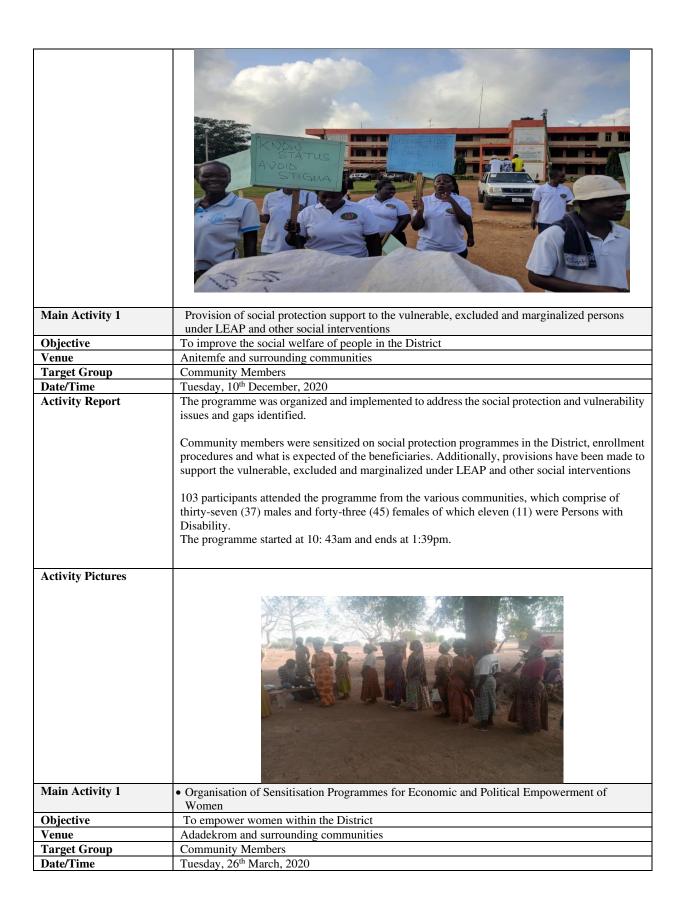

CONCLUSION AND THE WAY FORWARD

This section summarizes the 2020 Progress Report by exhibiting the key issues addressed and those yet to be addressed as well as the recommendations for successful implementation of subsequent quarters of the 2021 Composite Annual Action Plans (CAAP). The details are outlined in the sub-section 3.1 and 3.2.

3.1 Summary of Key Issues Addressed in 2020 Third quarter

In the course of implementation of the 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan, the following key issues were identified and successfully addressed;

- Funds for Monitoring and Evaluation activities were provided for the District Monitoring Team to conduct the exercise with ease. This provided funds for Quarterly M&E Reporting and the payment of Day Trip Allowances.
- Logistics in form of fuel, stationery and other Monitoring and Evaluation materials were provided timely for the conduct of the M&E exercise in the District. This provided solution to the logistical challenge raised by the District Monitoring Team.
- Funds were released for the 11 Decentralized Departments of the Assembly to carry out their mandated programmes, projects and activities in the 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan. This addressed the challenge of lack of funds for Departments to carry out their activities in the 2020 CAAP.

However, the implementation of the 2020 Composite Annual Action Plan, was challenged with the following key issues

- The effect of covid 19 strongly affected the activities of the District especially in the implementation of planned programs and activities of the Assembly. Due to the national lockdown, almost all the departments were inactive within the second and third quarters; a situation which adversely affected the functionality of the Assembly.
- Inadequate and untimely release of DACF has negatively affected the implementation of programmes, projects and activities in the District. This issue is yet to be resolved by the District Assemblies Common Fund Administrator.
- Lack of assigned permanent vehicle for Monitoring and Evaluation of programmes, projects and activities in the District. This pending issue is yet to be rectified by management of the District Assembly.

3.2 Recommendations

In conclusion, the way forward to address the challenges faced in the Monitoring and Evaluation activities, in addition to those yet to be addressed, include the following.

- Provision of permanent vehicle for Monitoring and Evaluation exercise in the District will help to improve the routine inspection and supervision of programmes, projects and activities.
- Based on the challenges identified in the implementation of DACF programmes, the Assembly recommends timely and adequate release of DACF to finance the plan and budget implementation in the District.
- Regular reshaping of road network in the District will improve Monitoring and Evaluation exercise.
- Organization of Monitoring and Evaluation training programmes by the National Development Planning Commission (NDPC) to equip District Monitoring Teams with the required knowledge and experience.
- Setting-up DPCU Fund to promote the functionality of DPCU as enshrined in the Local Governance Act 936, 2016 and the National Development Planning (System) Regulations, LI 2232, 2016.
