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CHAPTER ONE

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The Ada East District Assembly, was hitherto part of the erstwhile Dangme East District Assembly, and was established in June 2012 by L.I. 2130 and with its capital town at Ada-Foah. The District has since its creation implemented programmes and projects with the overall goal of attaining sustained accelerated growth and improving on the standard of living of the people in the District.

The programmes and projects are outlined in the Districts' Annual Action Plan which is derived from the District's Medium-Term Development Plan (2018 - 2021) prepared under Agenda For Jobs Policy: Creating Prosperity and Equal Opportunity for All (2018 – 2021) Framework. This report covers projects and programmes undertaken between January – December, 2020.

1.1 KEY MONITORING AND EVALUATION (M & E) OBJECTIVES / PURPOSE FOR THE YEAR 2020

The Objectives of the M&E for the year were as follows:

- To identify and analyse respective stakeholders who could affect the outcome of the DMTDP interventions
- To define appropriate indicators and set out achievable targets in relation to the DMTDP goals and objectives.
- To enhance participatory monitoring and evaluation of development programmes/projects
- To enhance sustainability of programmes/projects

1.2 SUMMARY OF ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE DMTDP

The Assembly in the year under review made a lot of progress in the implementation of its projects and programmes. With regards to the physical projects, a total of 20 projects were undertaken with 6 been completed and in use with the remaining being at advanced levels of completion.

The Assembly in the year under review was able to implement most of its planned non-physical programmes with about 90% been completed. Being an agrarian and a rural district most of the inhabitants have embraced agriculture and consequently been enrolled onto the Planting for Food and Job programme, this has increased their overall productivity. The timely release of the MAG funds and the GOG allocation to the agriculture department also greatly contributed to this achievement. The other sectors like the Environmental Health, Education and Central Administration also had enormous assistance from the Management of the Assembly to carry out their interventions. All of this greatly contributed to the successes that was chalked. The details of which will be expatiated in the subsequently chapters of this report. The summary however is presented below:

1.3 CHALLENGES ENCOUNTERED IN THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE DMTDP AND M & E

The following were some of the challenges faced by project implementation and M & E for the 2020 fiscal year;

- Inadequate logistics and budgetary support for monitoring and evaluation of programmes / projects in the district
- Inadequate funding for programmes / projects prioritized for implementation.
- Delay in the release of statutory funds from the Central Government affected the implementation of the some of the development interventions.

1.4 PROCESSES INVOLVED AND DIFFICULTIES ENCOUNTERED

The process of preparing the District 2020 Annual Progress Report was an integrative one which involves the use of qualitative, quantitative and other participatory techniques (e.g. Focus Group Discussion). A task team comprising Heads of Decentralised Departments (DPCU) prepared this report.

Data for the report was gathered from both primary and secondary sources. These include; projects / programmes supervision, focus group discussion, annual progress reports from Decentralised Departments, etc. These reports received were collated, cross-checked and confirmed by DPCU members before entered into the reporting format received from National Development Planning Commission.

The difficulties encountered in the preparation of the report included:

- 1. Delay in submission and inadequate information provided by some Decentralised departments and agencies in their annual reports.
- 2. Difficulty in the use of some of the NDPC templates especially those on the Programme register (Non Physical projects) and as such the Assembly had to adopt the template.
- 3. Difficulty in getting data to fill the template on Critical Development and Poverty Issues in 2020 and as a solution the Assembly provided narratives to some of these issues.
- 4. Differences in jurisdictional boundaries for some service providing agencies such as Police Service affected us in getting the data specific for our district.

Notes on the Indicators

With regards the agric. indicators (Total output of agric. production and percentage of arable land cultivated). The increased productivity of the agric sector in the district was mainly due to the fact that many of the farmers have enrolled onto the Planting for Food and Jobs programme and are enjoying subsidized fertilizer and improved seeds for cultivation. Arable lands are owned by individuals as such getting access to them is difficult in the district.

With the education indicators, net enrolment ratio, gender parity and completion rate, the Assembly was able to achieve most of its targets. However, getting data on the completion rate is very problematic for the statistician in the education directorate. The Commission should consider revising this particular indicator.

There was difficulty in setting targets for number of births and deaths and recorded cases for child trafficking and child abuse as realistically the determination of number of births and deaths is beyond human determination.

There was difficulty in getting data on the crime cases in the district as the Police district is bigger than the Assembly district and as such getting data for my district alone is difficult. On the whole the District Assembly was able to achieve most of its indicators.

2.6 UPDATE ON CRITICAL DEVELOPMENT AND POVERTY ISSUES

A. THE YOUTH EMPLOYMENT AGENCY

2.7 EVALUATIONS CONDUCTED, THEIR FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Ada East District Assembly collaborates with some agencies (CSOs and CBOs) to conduct some evaluations of some programmes and projects under implementation in the district.

The findings of these evaluations was to help the District Assembly to learn from the implementation so far done and how to use these findings to improve upon the implementation of these programmes and future expansion of those programmes. However, for the period under review the Assembly didn't carry out any evaluation activities. This is mainly due to the COVID -19 Pandemic.

2.8 PARTICIPATORY MONITORING AND EVALUATION (PM& E) UNDERTAKEN AND THEIR RESULTS

Participatory Monitoring and Evaluation is a valuable tool/ technique used to capture perceptions and assess whether the interventions in the DMTDP have met the expectations (objectives), especially, that of the poor and the vulnerable in the communities. The direct beneficiary community members were used in the Monitoring and Evaluation exercise. The Ada East District Assembly in the year under review didn't carry out any Participatory Monitoring and Evaluation activities.

CHAPTER THREE

CONCLUSION AND THE WAY FORWARD

3.1 KEY ISSUES ADDRESSED AND THOSE YET TO BE ADDRESSED

The key issues addressed were as follows:

- Identification and analysis of respective stakeholders who could affect the outcome of the DMTDP interventions
- Agreeing on appropriate indicators and setting of achievable targets in relation to the goals and objectives

The issues yet to be addressed include:

- Inadequate funding for programmes / projects
- Inadequate logistics and budgetary support for Monitoring & Evaluation
- Difficulty on the part of communities to release land for development projects coupled with high cost of land compensation.
- Enhancing stakeholder involvement in Monitoring and Evaluation (Participatory Monitoring and Evaluation).

3.2 RECOMMENDATIONS

- Timely release of funds from the Central government to enhance the speedy implementation of projects and programmes
- Continuous involvement of stakeholders in projects/programmes identification, design, implementation, Monitoring & Evaluation to enhance projects/programmes sustainability.
- Continuous sensitization/ dialogue with stakeholders to release and protect land earmarked for community projects.
- Strengthening of the District Development Control task force to protect areas zoned for community projects.
- Enforcement of development controls to prevent building at unauthorized areas (water ways, proposed roads) etc.
