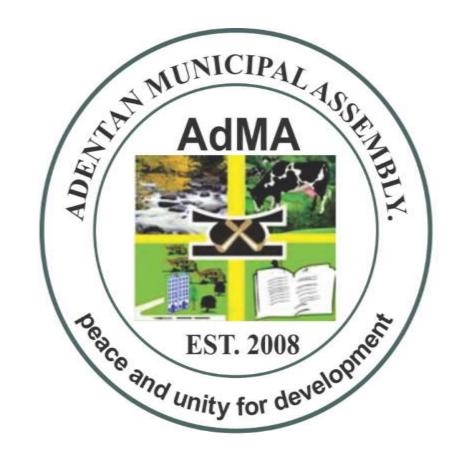

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CHAPTER ONE

1.0 Introduction

Adentan Municipal Assembly was created by a Legal Instrument (LI 1888) and was inaugurated on the 29th February, 2008. Hither-to, Adentan was part of the then Tema Municipal Assembly which is now Tema Metropolitan Assembly.

1.1.1 MISSION STATEMENT

The Adentan Municipal Assembly exists to facilitate the improvement of quality of life of the people within the Assembly's jurisdiction through equitable provision of services for the total development of the Municipality within the context of Good Governance.

1.1.2 VISION

The Vision of the Adentan Municipality is to create a modernized, harmonious, environmentally friendly and economically viable Municipality delivering people centered services with dedication.

1.1.3 OBJECTIVE

To assess indicators and targets established for tracking the progress of various interventions as well as their impact on beneficiaries.

1.1.4 KEY MONITORING AND EVALUATION OBJECTIVES FOR THE YEAR

Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) plays an important role in the implementation of Development Plans. The extent to which the Development Plan will achieve its set goals and objectives depends, to a very large extent, on a well-structured M&E framework that tracks the use of resources and ensures a high level of efficiency.

The key Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) objectives for the year under review were established in line with the objectives stated in the Medium Term Development Plan (2018-2021) and is aimed at achieving the higher goal which is **"to improve the quality of services to the people and promote growth in all sectors within the Municipality"**.

These are captured under the various Development Dimensions of the Agenda for Jobs, 2018-2021 as follows:

- Economic Development
- Social Development
- Environment, Infrastructure and Human Settlement

- Governance, Corruption and Accountability
- Ghana's Role in International Affairs

1.2 Purpose and Preparation of the M&E Plan For 2020

Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) is a concise document that plays a pertinent role in the implementation of Development Plans. The achievement of the Medium Term Development Plan (MTDP) set goals and objectives depends on how well the M&E framework that tracks the use of resources to ensure a high level of efficiency is structured.

The purpose of the M&E plan is to serve as a check and guide in the implementation of the Development Plan by;

- Identifying achievements, constraints and failures so improvement can be made in the MTDP and project designs to achieve better impact.
- Tracking the use of resources to ensure prudent management and accountability so as to sustain the interest of all stakeholders in the plan.
- Ensuring effective and efficient delivery of services to meet the intended needs of beneficiaries.
- It provides information for effective coordination of district development at the regional level.
- Evaluating the level of progress made in implementing the Medium-Term Development Plan (MTDP) and its goals, objectives and targets.
- It helps build the capacity of the stakeholders directly or indirectly affected by the project.
- It also ensures an easy flow of work and projects from the ex-ante stage to the postante stage.

1.3 Summary of Achievements and Challenges with the Implementation of the DMTDP

The project status for the year under review is given in Annex A. The progress report indicates that implementation was encouraging despite the various challenges which negatively affected the achievement of set targets as well as slowed down implementation.

1.3.1 Achievements

The Assembly for the year under review captured two hundred and twenty-nine (229) projects and programmes to be implemented in the Annual Action Plan. As at the end of the year 2020, 72.05% (165) were completed, 24.02% (55) were on-going, 3.93% (9) were not implemented. The analysis indicates that the Assembly spent resources on 96% (220) projects and programmes.

The Assembly's goal and objectives for the implementation of the MTDP is to improve the quality of services to the people and promote growth in all sectors within the Municipality and also achieve the set objectives as captured under the various dimensions of the Agenda for Jobs, 2018-2021. From the analysis above, the Assembly spent resources on 96 % (220) projects and programmes earmarked for the year under review and this was because priority was on activities that impacted positively on the living standards of the people. Training, capacity building and economic empowerment programmes, provision of education, health and road infrastructure, sanitation services, government flagship projects among others were all implemented. Projects that were ongoing had budgetary allocation made in the 2021 budget to ensure their timely completion. Measures have also been put in place to collaborate with GETFUND to ensure that abandoned projects are completed to augment the existing education infrastructure.

The table above present's analysis of the proportion of the MTDP implemented for 2018 and 2020. In the year 2018, which was the first year of implementation of the MTDP, the Assembly was able to achieve a 23.5% level of implementation and this increased to 45.8% in 2019 and is currently standing at 69.42% as at 2020. This is very encouraging since the Assembly had to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic, boundary disputes, inadequate data, untimely release of statutory funds and other challenges which adversely affected revenue generation.

Table 1.2 shows the number of planned and implemented programmes and projects captured in the 2020 Annual Action Plan (AAP).

A total of 229 programmes and projects were planned based on the Development Dimensions of the Agenda for Jobs, 2018 – 2021 which includes economic development, social development, environmental, infrastructure and Human settlement, governance, corruption and accountability and Ghana role in international affairs. As at the end of 2020, 220 programmes and projects had been initiated and implemented by the Assembly representing 96% with 9 programmes and projects not implemented representing 3.9 %.

The Assembly captured sixty nine social development programmes which forms majority of activities planned with sixty implemented by the Assembly. The environment infrastructure and human settlement dimension recorded the least number of programmes and projects planned. Nineteen programmes were captured for with all being implemented.

The Assembly even though was not able to carry out all planned activities due to the challenges stated below, funds were provided to improve services and promote the productivity of all sectors within the municipality in the year under review.

1.4 Challenges Encountered in the Implementation of the MTDP

There are a number of constraints and challenges which has impacted negatively on the implementation, monitoring and evaluation activities of the MTDP. These include:

- Inadequate data for effective revenue mobilization
- The imminent threat of the COVID-19 Pandemic
- Inadequate budgetary allocation and logistics for monitoring and evaluation of projects and programmes
- Inadequate office space
- Delay in the release of funds for carrying out activities

These have adversely affected the achievement of set targets.

1.5 Processes Involved in Conducting Monitoring and Evaluation

The monitoring of Plan implementation was in line with the M&E calendar developed by the Assembly. This included the following activities:

- The Municipal Planning Coordinating Unit (MPCU) and Staff of other departments performed monitoring activities.
- Facts finding methods such as interviews, observations of project activities and discussions with Projects Staff, Heads of Departments and beneficiaries were adopted to gather information.
- Quarterly review meetings were organized
- Preparation of quarterly and annual progress reports

The focus was to ensure that implementation processes are carried out to keep programmes/projects on course and completed on schedule.

CHAPTER TWO

2.0 Introduction

This chapter reports on the status of programmes and projects implemented, update on funding sources and disbursement, update on indicators and targets, update on critical development and poverty issues, evaluations conducted, their findings and recommendation, participatory monitoring and evaluations undertaken and their results for the year under review.

2.1 Monitoring and Evaluation Activities

The M&E activities used during the year under review included monthly field visits by the various implementing departments, monthly field visits by the Municipal Planning Coordinating Unit (MPCU), quarterly review meetings, evaluation and progress review workshops just to mention a few.

The major M&E activities that were undertaken were the monthly monitoring and quarterly review meetings held in collaboration with the various departments of the Assembly where departments reported on the progress of programmes and projects implementation for the year under review. The tracking of work was done by interviews with beneficiaries of projects, physical checks, site meetings and departmental level meetings amongst others

Below is the table showing the status of projects and programmes implemented for the year 2020.

2.2 Update on Funding Sources

2.2.1 Report on Funding by Sources (GH¢)

The main sources of revenue for financing development projects and programmes in the Municipality are the Districts Assembly Common Fund (DACF), Internally Generated Fund/ (IGF), Government of Ghana (GOG) Funds and Donor Funds.

The actual revenue for the year 2020 was Fourteen Million, Three Hundred and Seventy-Five Thousand, nine hundred and fifty-Seven Cedis ninety five pesewas (14,375,975.95) which represents 71.49% of the targeted revenue of GHC20,574,448.16.

The total inflow of funds for 2019 is shown in the table 2.4 below.

2.2.2 Comments on the report on Revenue Sources.

Several issues were identified relating to revenue and these include the following:

a. Utilization of funds in accordance with the Budget: The Assembly used the funds per the provision in the budget to enable her optimize objectives.

2.2.3 Implication on the attainment of the District Goals and Objectives.

The financial situation of the year 2020 had some effects on the implementation of activities which in the long run affected the attainment of the municipal goal and objectives. The municipal's goal is 'to improve the quality of services to the people and promote growth in all sectors within the Municipality.

The ability of the Assembly to generate 87.9% of the targeted revenue made it easier to implement numerous activities during the 2020 fiscal year and also led to the achievement of the set municipal objectives and overall goals.

Also, the delay in release of funds from the central government in terms of the District Assembly Common Fund in some instances halted or slowed down the implementation of some proposed projects.

2.3 Report on Disbursement

Table 2.5 below, shows the components on which disbursement was made. In 2020, the target expenditure stood at Twenty Two Million Three Hundred And Sixty Seven Thousand Two Hundred And Sixty Seven Cedis Six Pesewas (**22,367,267.06**), the actual expenditure stood at Thirty Five Million, Five Hundred And Sixty Six Thousand, and One Hundred and

Eighty Ghana Cedis Fifteen Pesewas. Indicating that the assembly was able to achieve 64.77 % of its target for the stipulated period.

2.3.1 Comments on Disbursement.

a. Adequacy of funds

Funds released for the implementation of projects /programmes is woefully inadequate. For instance, the DACF has a lot of strings attached to it and even before the release of funds to the Assembly; a lot of deductions have been made leaving only small amount for the projects/programmes.

b. Challenges regarding disbursements

- Indicators for DPAT are not in tune with the expenditure patterns of the Assembly.
- Processing of documentation for expenses is very slow
- Shortfalls in the allocations also affect the projects and programmes earmarked for the year.

2.3.2 Implication of expenditure situation on the attainment of the District Goals and Objectives.

The Municipality made efforts not to spend over their target expenditure but made sure all the sectors of development were tackled. In the 2020 fiscal year, the Municipal Assembly spent 64.77 % of the targeted sum in implementation of the proposed activities. This shows that the Assembly is putting measures in place to attain the goals and also manage the fiscal resources available.

2.4.1 Performance of Indicators against Targets

Economic Indicators

In 2020, the Assembly recorded an increase in employment opportunities created to reduce the unemployment cases within the municipality. In 2020, 203 jobs opportunities were created to assist the youth to make a living. The increase in employment opportunities is as a result of the establishment of a Mushroom centre in collaboration with EU which provides option for employment in cultivating, bagging, processing and marketing. Currently, there is the introduction of the Fish for Development Project (FIDEP) which will further create employment opportunities for the municipality. Also is the introduction of the Job Centre under the Youth Employment Agency which presents opportunities in employment in the municipality to help the rate of unemployment to reduce.

Social Indicators

In the area of social development, which comprises of health and education, the Assembly recorded a significant improvement. The Assembly in 2020 maintained its rate of enrolment for the year for KG, Primary and JHS within the Municipality. This stalemate can be attributed to the COVID 19 pandemic and its effect on education sector. With regards to health, the Assembly recorded a reduction in the maternal mortality rate with. This is as a result of availability of infrastructure and qualified health personnel in the various health institutions.

2.5.1 Ghana School Feeding Programme

Under the Ghana School Feeding Programme sixteen (16) Basic schools comprising 11,596 pupils are benefiting in the Municipality. Apart from attracting an increase in school enrolments and retention, the program included creating additional employment openings for catering services. Some children who hitherto often attended schools on empty stomach are now able to eat one balanced diet a day.

Major challenges to the school Feeding programme are delays in release of funds to caterers and inadequate funds due to increase in prices of food items over the years. There is also the need to rectify discrepancies in the electronic payments system.

2.5.2 GAMA Project

The government of Ghana in collaboration with the World Bank is undertaking the Greater Accra Metropolitan Area (GAMA) project in eleven MMAs to increase access to improved sanitation at both household and institutional level as well as remedy the occasional flooding within the Greater Accra Metropolitan Area through the construction of drains.

Adentan Municipal Assembly as part of it implementation is undertaking the construction of institutional sanitary facilities comprising twenty-five institutional toilet and water supply and bin bays. As part of efforts to improve access to household toilets, there has been the construction of Two Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirteen (2,813) facilities as at the end of

2020. Construction of emergency priority drains at Nmai Dzorn, Tot-to-Teen and Light Academy is ongoing.

As part of strategies to create awareness on the availability of toilet options at affordable prices through the GAMA Sanitation and Water Project, the household toilet promotion team embarked on a series of activities which include; the door to door visitation and sensitization at gatherings and durbar grounds etc. Nine institutional toilet facilities were commissioned by the Assembly.

During sensitization activities, the team visited specific various homes and houses with outmoded or traditional toilet facilities and educated members of the households on the need to change and build more hygienic household toilet which are partly sponsored by the government of Ghana and World Bank. Households without toilets were given notices to educate them on the legal implications of not having a toilet in their various homes.

2.5.3 Local Economic Development

The Local Economic Development strategy: focuses on the promotion of economic activities through education, improved governing policies; improved financing, better transportation and the creation of new businesses in the locality to maximize and keep returns within the Municipality. Below are tables showing the beneficiaries and training programmes done to promote LED in the municipality.

<u>Adentan News</u>

The publication of a monthly newspaper 'Adentan News' is promoting businesses within the Municipality through advertisement. It promotes businesses by showcasing what the business community has to offer. This has resulted in increase of sales for businesses in the Municipality. In effect, the Local Economic Development Plan for the Adentan Municipality has raised awareness of opportunities businesses can have from the Assembly in promoting their financial and economic affairs through local and external partnerships.

EU Promoting Mushroom production in the Adentan Municipality Project

In an effort to improve local economic development in the Adentan Municipality, mushroom farming has been identified as a lucrative and attractive agribusiness. This is informed by factors including little land requirements, low start-up capital and its high market demand.

In pursuance of this strategy, the Adentan Municipal Assembly and its co-applicants Centre for Local Governance Advocacy and Local Government Network in November 2016 signed a grant contract with the European Union (EU) to finance the implementation of a project: "Promoting Mushroom Industry in Adentan Municipality". The total eligible cost of the project is estimated at &820, 000.00. The EU has undertaken to finance a maximum amount of &660,000.00 while the Municipal Assembly, together with its implementing partners that is Centre for Local Governance Advocacy (CLGA) and the Local Governance Network (LOG Net) contributes approximately &160,000.00 in cash or kind to implement 3 year the project duration.

The project is expected to improve the mushroom industry and the general economic livelihood of mushroom farmers within the municipality for a sustainable local economic growth and development. Specifically, the EU funded project would seek to:

- Create employment for women, Youth, Persons with Disabilities (PWDs)
- Develop an environmentally sustainable production chain in the mushroom industry in the Adentan municipality
- Promote mushroom production for job creation, reduction of poverty and increase revenue within the municipality.

The project has the following facilities.

- Sales unit (for the sale of spawns(seeds), mushroom compost bags, fresh and all processed mushroom products)
- Shed for compost mechanized bagging, (this is to house the compost and bagging machines as well as provide a platform for preparation of compost),
- Cropping house, (for the demonstration of new technologies involved in mushroom production to farmers in the municipality),
- Solar dryers (will be introduced in the drying process of the mushroom production).
- Administration block

Fish for Development Project-Adentan. (FIDEP)

Fish for development project (FIDEP) is a forty month (40) local economic development project that is aimed at promoting the economic growth and development of the Adentan Municipality through fish farming. The project seeks to achieve this by promoting urban fish farming as a means of livelihood within the municipality creating jobs for women persons with disabilities and youth along the fish value chain and protecting water bodies along the fish value chain. The project is being implemented in the Adentan Municipality by the Adentan Municipal Assembly, the center for local governance advocacy and the local governance network in partnership with local and national stakeholders. The European Union is providing 80% of the total cost of the project with the implementing partners providing the 20%.

Project objectives

- Promote urban fish farming as a means of livelihood in the municipality
- To promote the needed infrastructure and training along the entire value chain to promote the fish industry
- To contribute to job creation for women Persons with Disability, youth and vulnerable groups along the value chain within the Adentan Municipality
- To contribute to persevering and protecting water bodies within the Adentan Municipality

<u>Project goals</u>

• Employment for 1200 youth 600 women 60 PWDS and 360 men along the fish value chain within the Adentan Municipality

- Construction of a demonstration center fish cages fish hatcheries and a cottage based processing center
- Twenty-two 22 water bodies protected and preserved within the municipality

<u>Beneficiaries</u>

Youth groups, women groups, persons with disabilities fish farmer's, cold stores and fish mongers, Adentan Municipal Assembly, Ghana Revenue Authority, transporters and transport operators, buyers or exporters, Department of Cooperatives Business Advisory Centre and Department of Agriculture of AdMA.

2.5.4 Implementation of Capitation Grant

There are sixteen (16) public schools within the Municipality benefitting from the capitation grant and this has boosted enrolment figures since its commencement. However, the delay in release of the grant and it not being adequate hampers quality education.

2.5.5 Gender and Vulnerability

Gender mainstreaming is defined as "the process of assessing the implications for women and men of any planned action, including legislation, policies or programmes, in all areas and at all levels.

Most household in the Adentan Municipality are headed by women and this is due to high rate of single parenthood. These women are forced to raise their children single handily. They are the household managers and provide food, nutrition, water, health, education and Family Planning. There is therefore the need to implement relevant socio-economic intervention targeted at this current situation to improve the lot of these women. 2.5.6 National Health Insurance Scheme

The National Health Insurance Scheme in the year under review registered 81,540 people in the Municipality. Out of this figure, new registration was 22,825 and renewals were 58,715. There was also the introduction of the mobile renewal system where stakeholders except for pregnant women could renew their biometric cards away from the office with the short code *929# on all mobile networks. 2.5.7 Environment, Climate Change and Green Economy

The mainstreaming of Environment, Climate Change and Green Economy is most relevant in ensuring sustainable development in the Municipality. The Assembly therefore undertook the following activities to protect the environment and ensure sustainable development.

- Prevent encroachment on protected areas, (water bodies, farm lands etc)
- Sensitization of residents on climate change
- Tree planting
- Waste sorting in schools and the municipal offices
- Sensitization on waste segregation

2.5.8 One District One Factory

One District One Factory (1D1F) is a government flagship project which seeks to assist the district to industrialize and create employment opportunities in the municipality. Adentan Municipality being among the 58 districts selected has identified Tekura Ventures which is into arts and crafts for exports and the factory is being assisted by the Assembly to benefit from the initiative.

2.6 Participatory Monitoring and Evaluation

Participatory M&E is a critical tool used to capture perceptions and assess whether interventions have met needed expectations, especially of vulnerable and the poor in society. It is broad-based and encourages the participation of the beneficiary communities and other stakeholders such as CBOs, NGOs, CSOs, beneficiary groups, MPCU members, Zonal Council members, project staff etc.

A key purpose of conducting PM&E is to build the capacity of communities to monitor the progress of their own developmental projects and programmes. It will also give community members the opportunity to decide on what is/not working well and the way forward.

This was done by mobilizing beneficiary communities and all other stakeholders for evaluation activities. Also information on the impact of project and the extent to which progress made in the implementation of physical projects will be collected to help in assessing the plan. Stakeholders will be organized to assist in dissemination of information and in decision making for progress of the projects.

CHAPTER THREE

3.0 The Way Forward

The preparation of the Annual Progress Report for 2020 has brought to the fore various implementation challenges. These include inadequate logistics and financial resources which has adversely affected the setting and achievement of targets. The way forward to ensure effective and efficient implementation of the Development Plan is to address these challenges and also manage effectively the available resources.

3.1 Key issues addressed and those yet to be addressed

The management of the implementation processes is a key issue that is yet to be addressed. Besides the release of funds to the various departments is also not coordinated to ensure that implementation is on schedule.

Furthermore, financial resources especially the District Assemblies Common Fund are not released on time and this stalls the progress of projects and programs.

The situation of deadlines not being met due to non-availability of data or late collection of data is also yet to be addressed. Some of the indicators could not be assessed because data was not available or there is no base line data.

Other issues that are being addressed include the following:

- Improving the mobilization of IGF as well as the training of revenue collectors
- Provision logistics for effective monitoring and evaluation
- Smooth implementation of the Composite Budget.
- Provision of office space for departments and units that are housed in rented premises.

3.2 Recommendation

A number of observations in the monitoring results as well as the challenges encountered during the preparation of this document calls for the under listed recommendations to be implemented by the Municipal Assembly as well as the various implementing departments and funding Agencies.

• The Municipal Assembly should provide adequate logistical support especially office equipment, vehicles and motor bikes among others to various departments.

• The release of funds for the implementation of programmes and projects should be on time and adequate

• The Municipal Assembly and decentralized departments should make conscious efforts to improve the implementation process

• The MPCU should be strengthened to work as a special implementation management structure to ensure that plans are properly implemented
